## Co-op


- **Child and Youth Assistant** – Provides support to children and youth impacted by trauma related to abuse.
- **Communication Assistant** – Assists with outgoing communications to clients and stakeholders.
- **Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (Co-op Student)** – Assists with the various projects/initiatives organized by a company's Diversity, Equity and Inclusion department to help remove barriers for people.
- **Events and Experiences Coordinator** – Works with a team of professionals to organize and facilitate large-scale events.
- **Human Rights Assistant** – Researches and analyzes issues relating to human rights to propose initiatives that respond to these issues.
- **Junior Analyst (Social Media)** – Supports the creation and facilitation of social media initiatives and strategies to help clients meet their goals.
- **Policy Analyst** – Develops and coordinates policies that impact our world.
- **Public Health Inspector** – Investigates health and safety related complaints, spills of hazardous chemicals, disease outbreaks, poisonings or workplace accidents.
- **Student Placement (Mental Health)** – Assists with services and programming organized for children and youth seeking mental health supports.

## Experiential Education Courses

 **Collaborative Prison Education (SOC1 4P03/CRIM 4P03)** – Sociology and Critical Criminology students take classes at Grand Valley Institution for Women through Walls to Bridges (an educational program that brings together incarcerated and non-incarcerated students to take post-secondary courses together in jails and prisons across Canada).

 **Critical Perspectives in Indigenous Criminalization (INDG 3P69/CRIM 3P69/SOCI 3P69)** – Students from various programs participate in critical discussions during seminars about topics like imprisonment, gendered violence, state crimes, the policing of protest, and Indigenous law.


 **Forensic Psychology (PSYC 3P53)** – Psychology students participate in simulations/experimentations to explore topics like psychopathy, risk assessment, criminal profiling, deception, eyewitness identification, and jury decision-making.


 **Forensic Psychology and Criminal Justice Honours Thesis (FPAC 4F95)** – FPAC students study and research a chosen topic; the process may involve library research, field work and empirical analysis.


 **Forensic Psychology and Criminal Justice Practicum (FPAC 4F92)** – FPAC students complete an 80-hour

practicum in a community organization, which may include law enforcement, mental health, or other relevant agencies.

• **Foundations for Community Engagement (SOC1 2F60/CANA 2F60/CRIM 2F60)** – Students examine philosophies, social histories and politics of community service; this study is accompanied by field trips in community settings.




 **Global Health Field Course (HLSC 3F97)** – Health Sciences students travel to a developing country to examine health issues with a focus on studying differences in health and disease patterns, health care delivery, and access.




 **Indigenous Cultural Production and Activism (SOC1 3Q90)** – Students participate in cultural projects like ImagineNative and community arts projects to better understand Indigenous study of knowledge.




 **Introduction to International Relations (POLI 2F20)** – Political Science students attend the Model UN Conference to learn more about topics relating to global politics like war, terrorism, and financial and environmental crises.

 **Labour and Social Justice Organizing (SOC1 4P21/LABR 4P21)** – Sociology and Labour Studies students create their own labour/social justice campaign or participate in an existing campaign.

 **Service Learning in Community Justice (SOC1 4P01/CRIM 4P01)** – Sociology and Critical Criminology students apply concepts and theories of conflict resolution and community justice to the practices of organizations such

as those involved in prison abolition/reform, mental health, shelters, halfway houses, and Indigenous Centres.

 **Wilderness First Responder (RECL 3Q46)** – Recreation and Leisure Studies students complete a long-term field experience (80 hours) in remote outdoor settings to gain practical experience in outdoor emergency scenarios and tools, techniques, and strategies for evacuation of patients in remote settings.
